Dear church,

In our Godly Play Sunday school a few years ago, we were looking at the circle of the church year and, as was our practice, wondering about it. We wondered at the different colors of the liturgical seasons, about which holidays are the most important to the church, and which of the special days are our favorite. And a young Norah piped up to say, "Homecoming is my favorite!"

Homecoming is an important and special day in the life of this congregation. We celebrate together the history of this church, the children and youth returning to school, the visits from church family gathered and scattered. On Homecoming, we sing that beloved hymn, "Bring Us Home," reminding us that we are called to do what we can to make this congregation a safe and inclusive space of belonging. From "our weary night...our closed-in fears...our wasted years...our selfish views...learnings we refuse..." into belonging that looks like "highest call, sharing love with all" and "awaken[s] us to grace." And in this church, the paraments for Homecoming Sunday are often red, reminiscent of Pentecost and the movement of the Holy Spirit within and around and through us.

What's not to love about Homecoming? Friends and family gathering near, Spirit red adorning us, singing of the complexity of being faithful followers of the Way of Jesus in our hymns...and this year, a rededication of an ADA-accessible chancel and an all-church photo as well!

Homecoming Sunday is not just a normal day in worship. It is a reminder that we are called to journey through life together—from birth to death, through dangers, toils and snares, we come together. Being church together is a sacred bond we share, and we do

not take that blessing for granted, and we do not take that call lightly.

Being church together doesn't mean that we agree on everything, theological or political or otherwise. Being church together doesn't mean that we are always perfect with our words and actions, and that we never cause one another harm. Being church together doesn't mean that we run and hide when any conflict is in front of us or when we get confused or when we are hurting.

Being church together means that we feel a call to share our lives with one another as a reflection of the way God has shared life abundant with us. It means that we show up for one another, whether that is at a grandkid's soccer game or a teenager's musical or a choir concert or a funeral or with cards and phone calls. It means that we communicate through conflict because we love one another enough to empathize and seek reconciliation. It means that we work together to do justice and love mercy and walk humbly with the Holy, because we know that even though there's a lot we can do alone, there's far, far more that we can accomplish together.

So this Homecoming, let's remind each other of this precious gift that we have been given: to journey with one another, sharing joys and sorrows, working together, listening and loving, receiving mercy and extending grace. What a blessing.

Come on home, beloveds. There's a place at the table with your name on it.

BUILDING LASTING BRIDGES THIS FALL

The work of Building Lasting Bridges is to connect as bridges do. In this small group we'll connect with ourselves and others through the lens of culture. "Lasting" refers to growing and learning as we build toward becoming a Beloved Community, sharing our experiences and learning how to engage meaningfully across different cultures.

We live in a changing multicultural community. How do we accept the changes and understand our cultures and experiences? This group is designed to provide a beginning point for creating community, trust, and a shared vocabulary. As we gain awareness of cultures and share our experiences we can gain humility to help us build these lasting bridges and beloved community.

The book *Building Lasting Bridges* and accompanying workbook exercises will guide us. However, this is an adventure in exploring cultures, not a book study. In February we'll dig into the second half of "Building Lasting Bridges." GOING CAR-FREE ON SEPTEMBER 22





Interfaith Climate Action members invite SFBC members, friends, and visitors to travel to church car-free and sustainably on Sunday, September 22. ICA's invitation is linked to the 24th Annual Global Car-Free Day.

Every Sunday before September 22 look for a map of greater Seattle either in the narthex or on a table downstairs during coffee hour. ICA members will be staffing the map and will help you flag your home location on it. The purpose of the map is to help you connect with people who live near you so you can find public transportation options together. And if going car-free isn't possible, carpooling to church is a significant step in reducing the number of vehicles on the road

Note: If you can't get to church before September 22 to add the location of your home to the map, please email your location to

smallgroups@seattlefirstbaptist.org and ask that you

be added. Please add your location to the map even if you can't come to church on September 22. That way, people can connect with you to travel (walk, bike, scooter, bus, train, or carpool) to church on other Sundays and special-event days.

World Car-Free Day is celebrated annually to encourage people to drive motor vehicles as little as possible, beginning by giving up driving for just one day. It is also to increase awareness of the negative impacts of vehicle emissions, which harm our health and contain greenhouse gases that cause climate change.

ICA members hope you will enjoy connecting with other SFBC folks to travel to church together. Traveling together sustainably may feel so good that you keep it up after Global Car-Free Sunday.

You enjoy stage plays? You've wondered about being in one? Join SFBC's Play Reading Circle! Once a month, on first Saturdays, we gather on-line to read from scripts that the church has found for interested folks.

They come with secrets and romances that she can only imagine. Her skills and discretion are much in demand, and she has managed to stuff a good sum of money into her quilt over the years. One day, she begins to receive beautiful letters from a lonesome Caribbean man who is working on the Panama Canal. He woos her through the mail, and persuades her to marry him, sight unseen. When he arrives in New York City, will he be the person he claims to be, or someone else? How will Esther forge her life?

This next time the Play Reading Circle will gather an hour earlier than usual – from 2:00 to 4:00pm.

CONSIDER CONTEMPLATION THIS FALL

"All will be well and all will be well and every kind of thing shall be well."

How can anybody make a statement such as this one in a world as crazy and chaotic as ours? These words of faith are attributed to Julian of Norwich, a woman who lived from 1343 to about 1416. She lived in Norwich, England during a time of plague, continuous war, religious fanaticism, and social unrest. Sound familiar?

Julian is considered to be one of the greatest Christian mystics. Mystics are people who encounter the Divine through direct experience rather than through religious practice. Silence and contemplation or meditation feature significantly in lives such as hers.

In our Exploring Contemplation Small Group we attempt to learn what it means to live like Julian and other mystics. We use music, readings, guided meditations, and silence to encounter the divine in our own lives. Beginning on September 20, our group will meet

on Zoom at 11:00am on the first and third Fridays of each month. This is a new day of the week and time for us.

Everyone is welcome in our group, whether you have been meditating for years or have never even tried it. Together we will explore that world of silence shared by Julian and mystics from many cultures and traditions. We will take a break from Doing to simply Be, in a place and time where every kind of thing shall be well.
