Hey y'all,

"I'm so happy to live in a world where there are Octobers."

One of my all-time favorite literary characters, Anne Shirley, says this in the book *Anne of Green Gables* shortly after she has been adopted by brother and sister, Matthew and Marilla Cuthbert. Anne is a whimsical, imaginative, freckled, red-haired orphan who is adopted by the Cuthberts. They were supposed to adopt a boy, but Anne showed up at the train station instead. They debate sending her back to the orphanage, but Anne wins them over. The Cuthbert home, Green Gables, becomes Anne's home too.

Anne has a particular proclivity for getting herself into trouble. She loses her temper at school when Gilbert Blythe calls her "carrots" and she breaks her chalkboard over his head. She buys hair dye off a peddler on the road who promises her it will turn her hair "a beautiful raven black," but instead it turns her hair an unfortunate shade of green. She lets her imagination wander so much while completing her chores that she often forgets important aspects. Like when Anne goes to get the plum sauce for a dessert and finds a dead mouse in the sauce because she forgot to cover it. Anne fishes the mouse out and decides not to say anything. But when the minister and his wife (whom Anne adores) are about to partake, Anne can't take it anymore and blurts out her confession completely distraught (though the four adults at the table are completely tickled).

One of Anne's best qualities is her imagination. Anne did not have an easy life before coming to Green Gables, but she relied on her imagination to get her through living with families who didn't treat her well and her time in the orphanage. Anne sees the beauty

in everything before and especially after she came to live at Green Gables. She names a bit of road in the fictional town of Avonlea that has blossoming cherry trees, "The White Way of Delight." She names the pond on her best friend Diana Berry's family farm, "The Lake of Shining Waters." She loses herself when she walks through fields and flowers, talking to trees and the wind.

As October dawns in Avonlea (on Prince Edward Island in Canada), the leaves are changing, the temperatures are cooling and beauty is everywhere for Anne with "plenty of scope for the imagination." So Anne tells Marilla, "I'm so happy to live in a world where there are Octobers." I have no doubt that Anne is happy to live in a world where there is every other month of the year too, but her words are an invitation: to embrace the beauty that is all around you.

My friends, as we enter another October, another Fall, I hope you find the happiness that October can bring. I hope that you can look around and see the beauty, in the grandiose, the mundane, and everything in between. Beauty truly is all around us.

TELL ME THE TRUTH ABOUT RACISM INTERACTIVE GODLY PLAY-STYLE STORIES FOR ALL AGES

Dear church family,

Early in 2024, I was invited by the American Baptist Home Missions Societies (ABHMS) to participate in a "train the trainers" event for a program called "Tell Me The Truth About Racism." This educational program explores the history of systemic racism in North America and Caribbean, and particularly in the USA, using an interactive storytelling methodology similar to Godly Play. I participated in this training over the course of March, April and May via Zoom, together with colleagues from a variety of mainline Protestant denominations. Together, we allowed the stories of racial oppression, prejudice, and antiracism struggles to move us and change us. This program is relatively new and the language is flexible enough to adapt to different age groups. A main focus of the curriculum is on social-emotional learning, or, how our emotional core is affected and engaged as we receive the historical stories and allow them to work inside our minds and hearts.

I invite you to join me as we act as a "test congregation" for this curriculum that is in development—and as I hone my skills to become a better facilitator and practitioner of this curriculum. We will have the opportunity to give some feedback to the curriculum writers at the end of the program.

Join me in the Parlor from 9:30-10:30am on Sundays November 3, 10, and 17.

TRAINING OCTOBER 9 9AM-1:30PM AT SEATTLE FIRST BAPTIST

Join Jewish Bridge Project facilitators Kohenet April Baskin and Diana Dvora Falchuk for a training on antisemitism and Christian supremacy on October 9th from 9:00am to 1:30pm at Seattle First Baptist Church. SFBC is a co-sponsor of this program along with the Church Council of Greater Seattle and several congregations.

Why this series now? The training is designed to provide timely support for you, your communities, and all of our efforts toward racial justice. While many of us have been working to understand and dismantle antisemitism and Christian supremacy as part of our efforts to end white supremacy and bring about liberation for all, the need for this integrated approach has

increased considerably since the Hamas attacks of October 7th, Israel's ongoing massacre of Palestinians and destruction of infrastructure and basic needs supplies in Gaza in what the ICJ has called "plausibly genocide," and the rise in both antisemitism and claims of antisemitism. In our congregations and partnerships, a lack of understanding of antisemitism is fueling disconnection, rupture, and harm. We need to know what antisemitism is, how it directly harms Jews, how it gets used as a political tool, and why and how we need to dismantle it as part of our efforts toward collective liberation. This training is designed to expand our knowledge, sharpen our strategies, and practice ways of seeing, knowing, being, and interacting that strengthen our abilities to hold a wider whole as we work together to dismantle all systems of oppression.

This training is not solely for Christians, though we will focus on the role of Christians in dismantling antisemitism and Christian supremacy.

This training will cover:

- Who are the Jews, what is antisemitism, and how antisemitism harms Jews and other groups targeted by oppression.
- The role of Christian supremacy and hegemony in shaping and maintaining the system and culture of antisemitism and of white supremacy more broadly.
- What Israel/Palestine has to do with antisemitism.
- How to differentiate antisemitism from claims of antisemitism that advance anti-democratic, divide and conquer strategies and policies, and what this has to do with our upcoming legislative session.
- Why we include the work of dismantling antisemitism and Christian supremacy as part of our efforts to build racial and all forms of justice, and how we do this through solidarity rooted in care for the health and wellbeing of the whole.
- Somatic and mindful practices that can help us recognize, stay present with, learn from, and interrupt our shaping related to Christian and/or white supremacy.

This training will blend together analysis, history, and frameworks with practices, space for reflection, and dialogue that engage our minds, bodies, hearts, and spirits as we hold a wider whole to meet this moment in our world.

Members of Seattle First Baptist Church have worked for many years to defend God's Creation. We are learning to be better stewards of the Earth in our personal lives, and we advocate for effective climate action at the local, state and national levels.

Progress has not come easily, or without opposition. On November 5, Washington voters will decide whether to roll back much of the progress we have made. We urge you to cast a "No" vote on Initiative 2066 and Initiative 2117.

I-2066 would eliminate incentives to help homeowners switch to clean electric appliances, and would nullify everything Seattle and Washington state have done to help us transition away from climate-wrecking fossil fuels.

I-2117 would repeal the landmark Climate Commitment Act and strip away state funding for ferries, buses, wildfire prevention, urban tree-planting, vehicle electrification, tribal climate initiatives, and more. The largest polluters would no longer have to pay for the damage they cause or to reduce the harm.

Join the broad coalition of community groups, businesses, tribes, and labor unions that are urging "no" votes on these dangerous initiatives funded by a wealthy hedge-fund manager.

SEATTLE JAZZ VESPERS NELDA SWIGGETT QUINTET "FOR THE BIRDS" OCTOBER 6 AT 6:00PM

Seattle Jazz Vespers is proud to present the Nelda Swiggett Quintet "For The Birds." A special concert featuring live music, images and poetry that invite reflection on our changing climate.

Seattle jazz pianist and composer Nelda Swiggett is a repeat performer in the Seattle Jazz Vespers concert series. Past audiences have enjoyed her diverse musical projects, including the Nelda Swiggett Trio, Clif and Nelda's Little Big Band, "Stringtet" (with cello and viola), the "Sisters" Duo with her sister Karin Kajita, and her high energy sextet, "Megabopolis."

Sunday, October 6, the Nelda Swiggett Quintet will perform her all-new suite of original music, "For the Birds." But this is not just a concert. The performance engages the power of artistic expression — live music, spoken words, images and poetry — to connect audiences deeply and emotionally to the scientific realities of climate change. Ultimately a story of hope, individuals leave the performance feeling empowered to take meaningful action.

On Earth Day 2017, Seattle Jazz Vespers and Interfaith Climate Action hosted the debut performance of Nelda's first climate-themed work, The Alaska Suite: a story of beauty, loss and hope. This piece has been performed 36 times to date, touching nearly 2500 people across Washington State with its message of hope and call to action. This included a benefit concert for Green Buildings Now, again at Seattle First Baptist Church, in May 2022. Building on the success of The Alaska Suite, Nelda is excited to debut her new climate piece, For the Birds. And how fitting to present it at Seattle Jazz Vespers hosted at Seattle First Baptist Church.
