


# THE THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT

**LUKE 3:7-16 (NRSVUE)** 

John said to the crowds coming out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? Therefore, bear fruits worthy of repentance, and do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor,' for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; therefore every tree that does not bear good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire."

And the crowds asked him, "What, then, should we do?" In reply he said to them, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none, and whoever has food must do likewise." ## SFBC DONATION TO THE AMOS TRUST CHRISTMAS APPEAL

At the December 3rd monthly meeting, the Council of Ministries decided to make a \$2500 contribution to the Amos Trust Christmas Appeal. Money collected during the Christmas Appeal will provide the following for people in Gaza:

- Essential medical care with Al-Ahli Baptist Hospital.
- Vital food and water aid, in coordination with MA'AN Development, the Welfare Association, and Gaza Sunbirds, who are purchasing food and water locally while aid trucks are being denied access to central Gaza.
- Therapeutic interventions for women and children, aspiring to provide support for approximately 8,500 women and 35,000 children in 2025.
- Support for Gazan writers, artists and musicians who still convey beauty in the face of horror and who are documenting their experiences in Gaza.

Any donation to the Amos Trust given from December 3-10 will be doubled through a matching grant to their organization. It is our hope that our \$2500 donation (doubled to total \$5000) will make a positive difference for our brothers, sisters and siblings living in Gaza.

Amos Trust is a small creative human rights organization committed to challenging injustice, building hope and creating positive change. They are "rooted in the inclusive stream of Christianity that stresses justice and liberation for the oppressed." They "work to create this through non-violence, reconciliation and peace...Amos' name was inspired by Dr. Martin Luther King's use of the Hebrew prophet Amos' call to "Let justice flow like rivers." Many thanks to Susan Blythe-Goodman for sharing the Amos Trust Christmas Appeal with the Council of Ministries.

# The Third Sunday of Advent | WORDS FOR THE BEGINNING DO THE GOOD THAT IS YOURS TO DO



#### THE GOOD THAT IS YOURS

As John the Baptist preaches about transformation, he receives the same question three times from those gathered by the river: "What, then, shall we do?"

His responses are straightforward and practical, but also particular. He tells the crowd to share any excess clothing and food with those who have none. He tells the tax collectors not to use their position of power to launder and steal money. He tells the soldiers not to coerce and threaten, and to be satisfied with their wages.

In other words, he tells them what not to do, which leads me to assume that those showing up to be baptized are carrying some things they need to atone for. And yet, they have shown up. They have journeyed into the wilderness to be baptized and transformed. They long for a new beginning.

At the center of this quilt square collage, a pinwheel of fire spins. It represents the Holy Spirit impelling the world to turn. Surrounding it are four petal shapes that bloom like a flower. They are each filled with branches of fruit. When we align ourselves with the movement of the Spirit, we can do the good that is ours to do. Our actions can bear good fruit.

The petals and pinwheel are encapsulated by the outline of a blue cross. Four walls of the cross contain broken fragments. In stark contrast to the lush fruit, the fragments are like shards of glass. They symbolize the sins John the Baptist sees present amongst the crowds: extortion, coercion, and the hoarding of power and resources. And yet, these fragments are linked together by blue arrows filled with the waters of baptism. There is a way to begin again.

From each cardinal direction, a triangle of Holy Spirit fire faces inward, pointing us to baptism and transformation. When we do the good that is ours to do, we bear good fruit—fruit that repairs and nourishes, fruit that grows into the four corners of the earth. —Rev. Lisle Gwynn Garrity
