Hey y'all,

There's a scene in the third season of the Canadian comedy, Schitt's Creek, where Catherine O'Hara's Moira Rose finds herself at an awkward lunch with her adult daughter, Alexis. It's a bit of a subtle running joke in the show that Moira's favorite child is her adult son, David. So, when she invites him to lunch in front of Alexis and he is unavailable, she reluctantly invites Alexis instead. To prepare for the lunch where she does not think she will have much to talk to her daughter, she prepares notecards with questions to ask her. Alexis discovers these and gets upset reading them aloud. Alexis reads, "What is your favorite season?" And Moira very excitedly responds, "Awards!"

I don't know if I would say that awards season is my favorite season, but it is a season I greatly enjoy. While it is the beginning of a new year, it is also the height of awards season. I love awards show, particularly those for film and television. I could take or leave the Grammy's because I don't think they give Beyoncé the respect and recognition she deserves (but maybe they will this year!). When the Golden Globes and Oscars air, I make it a priority to be seated for the red carpet arrivals and the duration of the show.

I love awards season because I think art should be celebrated. I enjoy attempting (and typically failing) to watch all of the Oscar best picture nominees. I tear up when an actor is completely blindsided by their win (especially if they beat out one of the greats, like Meryl Streep or Denzel Washington). I nod along when artists make impassioned speeches for justice. I gasp with the rest of the audience if someone trips on their way up to the stage. I have high standards for the host of the show and those standards usually aren't met (Tina Fey and Amy Poehler cohosting the Golden Globes is the standard), but the host always manages to make me chuckle at least a little bit. This year, Keith and I decided to try and get a jump on watching some of the films projected to be Oscar best picture nominees (maybe we'll make it through all of them this year!). A couple weeks ago we watched Conclave. The film tells the story of the selection of a new pope after the unexpected death of a current one. There are twists and turns, mind games played, scandals, and ultimately a new pope is chosen which ends up being the biggest twist of all. A conclave is the sequestered assembly of the cardinals as they vote on the new pope. Before the conclave begins, Cardinal Thomas Lawrence, played by Ralph Fiennes, delivers a homily to all the gathered cardinals.

In the homily he says, "Over the course of many years in the service of our mother, the church, let me tell you, there was one sin which I have come to fear above all others. Certainty...Even Christ was not certain at the end. 'My God! My God! Why have you forsaken me?'...Our faith is a living thing precisely because it walks hand in hand with doubt. If there was only certainty and no doubt, there would be no mystery and therefore no need for faith."

Normally when I see a homily or sermon depicted in film or television, I find it lacking. I think to myself that the person who wrote the script did not consult a preacher. But, I found Cardinal Lawrence's homily to be quite good. I think he gives an important word to the gathered conclave in the film, to the viewers, and for us as we begin a new year.

There are many unknowns as we come into this new year. Many of us have fear and anxiety because of the unknowns. Many of us may even be asking questions of God, and that's okay. For our faith to continue to grow and develop, we have to remain open, be curious, ask questions, and be alright with accepting the mystery. My friends as we enter this new year, I pray that you will lean into the mystery and ask questions. Ask questions seeking to ever deepen and grow in your faith. Take heart in knowing that God is with us and welcomes and holds all of our questions and our doubts.


GREETERS AND USHERS NEEDED!


A FUN LOOK FORWARD AND BACK FOR ICA

A CLIMATE JUSTICE INITIATIVE IN BEACON HILL

During the depths of the Covid pandemic in 2020, Interfaith Climate Action began researching ways that Seattle First Baptist Church members could use our time and money to support an equitable transition to a clean-energy economy in our community.

Within a few months we were in dialogue with community groups working to bring the benefits of clean energy to the diverse Beacon Hill community, which has suffered disproportionately from noise and air pollution from nearby airports, roads and industries.

We embraced the vision of a fossil-fuel-free "resilience hub" on the campus of Bethany United Church of Christ, where neighbors could take refuge during extreme weather events. SFBC became a leader in supporting this effort. The Outreach Committee provided a \$4,000 challenge grant, and Administrator Darren Hochstedler created a designated fund to accept donations and make expenditures for the Green Buildings Now partnership.

The Green Buildings Now leadership team included members of SFBC, Bet Alef Meditative Synagogue, University Unitarian Church, Seattle Insight Meditation Society, Prospect United Church of Christ, and University Congregational UCC.

Here's what we have accomplished.

With generous contributions from SFBC members and others, grants from two foundations and two benefit concerts, we raised \$147,000 for the Beacon Hill resilience hub (now known as a cooling center).

In 2022, grant funds were used to install an extensive solar power array on the roofs of the two largest buildings on the Bethany UCC campus, along with battery backup. The sanctuary building was weatherized using funds donated through Green Buildings Now.

This past fall, most of the remaining Green Buildings Now funds were used to fully weatherize all four buildings on the campus and to replace a gas furnace with heat pumps in one building.

We expected that, through a partnership with the City of Seattle, the campus would be fully decarbonized by now. The Seattle City Council made a \$455,000 budget appropriation, but the Bethany UCC leadership was troubled by contract language for release of the city funds and decided the church could not accept the appropriation.

Bethany's board and pastor, the Rev. Angela Ying, still intend to create a cooling center, which will take more time and fundraising. They are also working with the Beacon Hill Council, El Centro de la Raza and other community groups to establish three cooling centers in Beacon Hill.

Thanks to you and other generous donors, Green Buildings Now exceeded our fundraising goal and helped lay the groundwork for a future cooling center. The improvements to the Bethany campus will also significantly reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Members of the Green Buildings Now leadership team remain committed to climate justice, and we have asked our Beacon Hill partners to let us know how we can help their efforts going forward. However, Green Buildings Now has accomplished what it set out to do, and leadership team members are moving on to the next phase of life.

By that, I mean you will continue to be graced with realizations that you are becoming someone in whose presence others are better able to experience the gift and miracle of who they really are deep down and who they are called to be, so that they in turn can pass on the contagious energy of healing to others."

When Seattle became home in the late 80s, Johnson made a key connection with jazz vocal eminence Mark Murphy at a workshop he was doing. His mentoring both helped her develop her talent and facilitated getting the word out that an impressive new vocalist was on the scene. "Good news for jazz vocal fans!" notified Murphy. "Listen to her sureness of pitch, imaginative song selection and her ability to lyricize to a Joe Henderson theme. Many treats here, my friends. In a world of noise, yahoo, and recorded B.S., the first thing you hear here is none of that. It's because this girl knows she is a jazz singer and doesn't have to do anything else!"

Seattle welcomed Kelley. She had the privilege of working with and being encouraged by the greats Buddy Catlett and Clarence Acox until she met and forged a lasting musical relationship with pianist John Hansen. Kelley Johnson and the John Hansen trio with bassist Paul Gabrielson and drummer Jon Wikan gave her the modern roots jazz piano trio sound with a "horn" up front, much like Miles' early rhythm sections. Having found the sound and the camaraderie she was looking for, her artistry bloomed, as did her arranging and lyric writing. Her first album featured both Hansen and Fred Hersch. Hersch, perhaps the preeminent vocal accompanist extant, produced her first album, "Make Someone Happy" which also featured Larry Grenadier, Steve Wilson and Lewis Nash.

Kelley has served as a professor at Cornish College of the Arts and Director of the Seattle Metropolitan Urban League's Children's Jazz Chorus among countless other musical ventures.
